

Joaquin Muñoz, PhD (Pascua Yaqui Tribe | he/him/his)

is an assistant professor of Indigenous Education at the University of British Columbia. He grew up on the Pascua Yaqui Indian Reservation in Arizona, where he learned early on about the complicated issues of race, culture, history, and oppression. His research focuses on Indigenous Education and teacher education, with a focus on supporting teachers to be effective when working with diverse Indigenous populations. Muñoz has spent the past decade developing skills for this work by using Indigenous Circle Work, Indigenous Young Adult Literature, the Theatre of the Oppressed, and various forms of art, dialogue, critical literacy and culturally sustaining pedagogies.
